


A Lesson on The Turtle and the Rabbit by Kenneth Allen

Grade Level: Grade 3

Subject Area: English Language Arts **Lesson Length**: 1 hour 30 minutes

Lesson Keywords: A race to remember, 3rd grade language arts activities

Lesson Description: This lesson plan is designed for the students that need to proof read every assignment before turning it into the teacher. This assignment will focus on critical thinking, vocabulary, test taking techniques, and time management. In addition, this lesson will teach students the basic understanding for marginal errors. Students will need to read the passage and describe the outcome of this race. Students will be given a full hour to complete this task. The lesson that will be learned from this assignment is the ability to proof-read all work before submitting. This assignment should take only 30-minutes to complete, but the students have an entire hour before submitting their assignment.
