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# A Lesson on Penguins by Antonius Hadley

Grade Level: Grade 4

**Subject Area**: English Language Arts **Lesson Length**: 1 hour 30 minutes

Lesson Keywords: Reading, Comprehending, Writing, Comparing, Contrasting

**Lesson Description**: The goal for this lesson is to learn more information about penguins as well as applying the information learned to compare and contrast to other birds by reading, comprehending, and writing. The student will learn why the passage was written, and what information is important to take out of the reading.

When the penguin is on land, it walks along slowly, and this limited?mobility may be one reason the penguin spends more time in the water. The?penguins food source is in the water, the fish it catches. They have solid?bones, while other birds have bones that are not solid.
