

A Lesson on A Better Community by Katherine Mackeeman

Grade Level: Grade 3

Subject Area: English Language Arts

Lesson Length: 2 hours

Lesson Keywords: Community, recycling, plastic, environment

Lesson Description: The goal of this lesson is to give students the opportunity to practice their reading comprehension and writing skills while enforcing the importance of environmentally sustainable practices through the passage. The teacher will read the story aloud to the class once, then students will have the opportunity to read and re-read the passage themselves in order to successfully understand the passage and apply it to the vocabulary questions and discussion activity. The students will be analyzing the underlying themes of the passage such as the benefits of working together and how a little effort can go a long way.
