


A Lesson on The First Flag by Carly Chinners

Grade Level: Grade 3

Subject Area: English Language Arts

Lesson Length: 2 hours

Lesson Keywords: Independence Day.

History.

Lesson Description: This is a lesson for the Fourth of July to learn about Independence Day. To be done at the end of the year as a truly fun assignment to get the students ready for summer. But of course, there is always an essay involved.
