

A Lesson on The Little Red Hen by Mary Claire Murphy

Grade Level: Grade 3 Subject Area: English Language Arts

Lesson Length: 2 hours

Lesson Keywords: Reading, Language Arts, Hard Work, Farm, Vocabulary, Farm Animals

Lesson Description: In this lesson students will read The Little Red Hen individually and then reread it in groups. Students will determine the definition of vocabulary words given to them and use this information to answer the questions. The class can come together to discuss the questions or post to an online environment set up by the instructor. Student will also complete an essay. This lesson can take up to two days to complete, and the instructor can share examples of the essays after being graded.

Lesson Content: Book/Story/Reading Passage

Instructions: Please read the following reading passage as many times as needed (aloud and silent) before starting to go through other lesson pages. Understanding the content of this passage is very important since the lesson activities will be all about this content. Feel free to print the passage if needed.

The wheat plants had many more seeds. Those can be planted or used to?make food. When the wheat was ripe she said, Who will take this wheat to the?mill? The mill is a place where people grind the seeds. It turns into flour. Then?you can make bread from the flour.?

Not I, said the Duck.?

I will, then, said the little Red Hen, sadly. I will do it myself. So then?she took the wheat to the mill.?

When she brought the flour home she said, Who will make some bread?with this flour??

Instructions: This discussion forum will have questions for students to respond. Read the posted questions, and respond to each. Students are responsible for posting one initial and and two peer responses for each topic. Class may also do a class discussion answering these questions.

2 - Would you rather be?

3 - Do you agree?

Do you agree that Red Hen kept the bread for herself and her chickens? Should she have shared the bread with Duck and Goose? Why or why not?

Task 3: Writing Activity

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Instructions: Write at least two paragraphs about how you think that the story would be different if the other farm animals would have help Red Hen. Be sure to explain why it would have changed the outcome of the story. Try to use some vocabulary words in your essay.?
