A Lesson on Our Lemons by Vanessa Tuliau

Grade Level: Grade 3

Subject Area: English Language Arts

Lesson Length: 2 hours

Lesson Keywords: geography, botony

Lesson Description: Students are to start by reading the passage on lemons and coming to understand the story. Once they comprehend it they are to go on and answer 8 multiple questions on 4 vocabulary words within the short story - 2 questions per word. After the multiple choice questions they will participate in discussions on 3 different threads concerning the story. Finally, students will answer a question asking whether or not they believe it is important to know where your food comes from, for example lemons. This will be a 500 words essay. They will have 2 hours.

There are always baskets of lemons outside our house. When?they start to turn yellow, my father takes the basket of lemons into town. He sells them?to stores.?

The lemons grow all year. Every day, there are some to pick. So we always have?a job to do. Some times of year there are more lemons. Those weeks we work all day?on Saturday and Sunday to get the lemons. My father may have to make a few trips?into town with the lemons.?
