

The Turtle and the Rabbit by Colleen Mcgrath

Grade Level: Grade 3 Subject Area: English Language Arts Lesson Length: 1 hour

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Lesson Keywords: ELA, Essay, multiple choice, Short answer

Lesson Description: Students will be able to discuss and reflect on the story The Turtle and the Rabbit. The lesson will consist of 3 main parts, broken down into multiple choice questions, a discussion post among peers and a short essay question.

Lesson Content: Book/Story/Reading Passage

Instructions: Please read the following reading passage as many times as needed (aloud and silent) before starting to go through other lesson pages. Understanding the content of this passage is very important since the lesson activities will be all about this content. Feel free to print the passage if needed.

Task 2: Forum Discussion
