

A Lesson on The Little Red Hen by Barbara Figueredo

Grade Level: Grade 3 Subject Area: English Language Arts Lesson Length: 2 hours

Lesson Keywords: lesson, fable, passage, grade three, vocabulary, discussion, writing

Lesson Description: Students will read the passage, "The Little Red Hen" and complete questions based on the vocabulary and sequencing of the texts, including the characters, their motivation, and impact on the lesson from the text.
