


A Lesson on The Turtle and the Rabbit by Alessandra Matarazzo

Grade Level: Grade 3

Subject Area: English Language Arts Lesson Length: 30 minutes or less Lesson Keywords: boast, fast, slow, time

Lesson Description: "A Lesson on the Turtle and the Rabbit" depicts a story of a race between a tortoise, who is a creature that moves very slowly- and a rabbit, who moves really fast. The hare is very confident of winning, so it stops during the race and falls asleep. Tortoise is a slow-moving creature that knows his limitations, yet carries a level of confidence and strength that leads him to victory.
