

A Lesson on Little Pink Riding Hood by Sarah Mccafferty

Grade Level: Grade 3

Subject Area: English Language Arts **Lesson Length**: 1 hour 45 minutes

Lesson Keywords: Reading, Writing, Little Pink Riding Hood

Lesson Description: During this lesson, students will read and comprehend the passage of Little Pink Riding Hood. They will use context clues to figure out the meanings of various vocabulary words and then discuss the traits of the characters and the authors overall message behind Little Pink Riding Hood.
