

A Lesson on How the Firefly Got Its Light by Jenna Wilhite

Grade Level: Grade 3 Subject Area: English Language Arts Lesson Length: 1 hour Lesson Keywords: How the Firefly Got Its Light

Lesson Description: Students learn through a folklore passage called \"How the Firefly Got Its Light\" paired with 4 vocabulary multiple choice questions, 3 discussion questions and one writing essay portion.

Instructions: Please read the following reading passage as many times as needed (aloud and silent) before starting to go through other lesson pages. Understanding the content of this passage is very important since the lesson activities will be all about this content. Feel free to print the passage if needed.

Task 2: Forum Discussion

Instructions: This discussion forum will have questions for students to respond. Read the posted questions, and respond to each. Students are responsible for posting one initial and and two peer responses for each topic.

1 - Why does the moon have no friends? Explain why the moon has no friends and is therefore asking the fly to stay up for him in exchange for the secret.

2 - Why would the mice not benefit from a light? The fly benefitted from the light but the mice said it was too dangerous for them to have a light, why is that?

3 - How did the moon and fly help each other? What did the moon want and what did the fly want, was it an even exchange?

Task 3: Writing Activity Instructions: You are to write and post a 200 words essay on what would be a good trade for the mouse in the story similar to the trade of the moon's friendship and the fly's light. Make sure to provide a detailed answer.
