


A Lesson on The Train Ride by Toriann Garver

Grade Level: Grade 5

Subject Area: English Language Arts

Lesson Length: 1 hour

Lesson Description: In this lesson we will be reading about a boy and his mother, taking a train ride. After reading the passage, we will be have four vocabulary words we will have a few questions to answer about each one. Then we will partake in a class discussion. After our discussion we will answer some questions on our own.
