

A Lesson on My New Brother by Danielle Brock

Grade Level: Grade 5

Subject Area: English Language Arts Lesson Length: 1 hour 30 minutes

Lesson Keywords: Fifth Grade Lesson Plan USF College Of Education

Lesson Description: This lesson is to have fifth graders comprehend the story. They will be able to make inferences of the story and draw conclusions. The students will also be able to use context clues to figure out what a vocabulary word means.
