



A Lesson on The Boy Who Cried Wolf! by Chelsea Christiansen

Grade Level: Grade 3

Subject Area: English Language Arts

Lesson Length: 1 hour 15 minutes

Lesson Keywords: The Boy Who Cried Wolf, Lesson, Fable, Morals, Vocabulary

Lesson Description: This lesson will teach the students the story of "The Boy Who Cried Wolf." It will teach them the vocabulary from the story. It will also teach them the moral of this fable and how it is not good to lie.
