

A Lesson on See Our Progress in Relation to STEM Biology by Justin Carruth

Grade Level: Grade 8

Subject Area: English Language Arts **Lesson Length**: 1 hour 30 minutes

Lesson Keywords: Reading, Writing, Comprehension, Project, Progression

Lesson Description: The goal of this lesson is to allow the students to begin to understand the importance of progressing through a project. The students will read and reread the passage to gain an understanding of the project that was completed within this passage. The students will closely read the passage to ensure that they understand the passage, and they understand the vocabulary words that are pulled out of the passage to ensure comprehension. The students will also have a time for discussion over the passage to ensure further comprehension is occurring. Finally, there will be a writing portion of this assignment that will allow students to answer a question that will help deepen their understanding of the passage that relates to progressing through a project.
