


A Lesson on The Turtle and the Rabbit by Renee West

Grade Level: Grade 3

Subject Area: English Language Arts

Lesson Length: 2 hours

Lesson Keywords: Vocabulary, Reading, Writing, Critical thinking

Lesson Description: This lesson is designed to help students better their reading comprehension alongside sharpening their vocabulary skills while also forming opinions and critical thinking on the passage. The students will learn new vocabulary that is presented in the passage, have a class discussion to better enhance their thinking skills and at the end of the lesson they will enhance their writing skills by completing a short essay on the topic.
