

A Lesson on A Better Community by Carol Colvin

Grade Level: Grade 3 Subject Area: English Language Arts Lesson Length: 2 hours Lesson Keywords: Reading, Vocabulary, Writing, Recycling

Lesson Description: The goal of this lesson is to provide students opportunities to practice their close reading skills, vocabulary skills, and writing skills. The students will also learn about recycling and they will form a plan to recycle at their own home or how they can make a difference in their community.
