Grade Level: Grade 4 Subject Area: English Language Arts Lesson Length: 1 hour 30 minutes Lesson Keywords: farm, road trip, family, reading, writing, vocab Lesson Description: Using the text provided, students will learn vocabulary, discuss text with peers and write a small opinion essay.
