

A Lesson on The Turtle and the Rabbit by Semmes Bruce

Grade Level: Grade 3 Subject Area: English Language Arts Lesson Length: 1 hour

Lesson Keywords: Reading, Writing, The Turtle and the Rabbit, Vocabulary

Lesson Description: The students will answer vocabulary questions, discussion questions, and do a writing activity based on The Turtle and the Rabbit story.

Lesson Content: Book/Story/Reading Passage

Instructions: Please read the following reading passage as many times as needed (aloud and silent) before starting to go through other lesson pages. Understanding the content of this passage is very important since the lesson activities will be all about this content. Feel free to print the passage if needed.

Task 2: Forum Discussion

2 - Why did the turtle want to race?

Out of all the animals, the turtle challenged the rabbit to a race.? Why do you think the turtle wanted to race the rabbit?

3 - Why does the rabbit take a nap?

Why do you think the rabbit stopped to take a nap instead of finishing and winning the race?

Task 3: Writing Activity

Instructions: 1. The story of the turtle of the rabbit is a good example of the phrase actions speak louder than words.? Tell about a time in your life where you were like the rabbit and your words spoke louder than your actions or a time when you were like the turtle and your actions spoke louder than your words.
