

A Lesson on The Little Red Hen by Hayley Rummel

Grade Level: Grade 3

Subject Area: English Language Arts Lesson Length: 1 hour 30 minutes

Lesson Keywords: Little Red Hen, 3rd Grade English Language Arts, Vocabulary

Lesson Description: In this lesson we will be covering point of view, opinion based discussions, determining the meaning of in text vocabulary and phrases, as well as cause and effect. By reading the passage students will discover how to decipher vocabulary words from text. Students will go through numerous vocabulary based questions, thoughtful discussion posts while learning from fellow classmates, and write an opinionated essay by using their knowledge and the text to support their opinion.

Lesson Content: Book/Story/Reading Passage

Instructions: Please read the following reading passage as many times as needed (aloud and silent) before starting to go through other lesson pages. Understanding the content of this passage is very important since the lesson activities will be all about this content. Feel free to print the passage if needed.

The wheat plants had many more seeds. Those can be planted or used to?make food. When the wheat was ripe she said, Who will take this wheat to the?mill? The mill is a place where people grind the seeds. It turns into flour. Then?you can make bread from the flour.?

Task 2: Forum Discussion

Instructions: This discussion forum will have questions for students to respond. Read the posted questions, and respond to each. Students are responsible for posting one initial and and two peer responses for each topic.

1 - Do you think the Little Red Hen was being unfair?

When the Little Red Hen said, No, you won't, You did not help. I will eat it myself do you think the Little Red Hen was being unfair towards the Goose and the Duck? Explain in your own words why or why not the Little Ren Hen was being unfair.?

2 - Being Disapppointed

Why do you think the Little Red Hen was disappointed with the Goose and the Duck? Can you explain a time when you were disappointed in someone??

3 - Would you rather?

Would you rather be the Goose and the Duck or the Little Red Hen in the story? If you picked the Goose and the Duck, what would you do differently if you were the Little Red Hen? If you picked the Little Red Hen, what would you do differently if you were the Goose and the Duck??

Task 3: Writing Activity

Instructions: For your writing assignment you are required to answer both of the questions using no less than 500 words.?

- (1) How did the Little Red Hen feel when no one helped her make the bread? What caused the Little Red Hen to say no to the Goose and the Duck and what was the effect of her saying no?? Do you think the Goose and the Duck were in the wrong or do you think the Little Red Hen was in the wrong when she told them they couldn't eat the bread? Why? Make sure you provide specific examples from The Little Red Hen.?
- (2) If you were the Goose and the Duck, how would you feel when the Little Red Hen told you that you couldn't eat the bread? If you were the Little Red Hen, how would you feel if no one helped you make the bread? Describe the emotions you would be feeling.?

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
