

A Lesson on How the Firefly Got Its Light by Paul Kauffman

Grade Level: Grade 3

Subject Area: English Language Arts

Lesson Length: 1 hour

Lesson Keywords: Firefly folktale lesson plan

Lesson Description: Language Arts lesson based on a folktale about how the firefly got its light. The assignment includes four vocabulary questions, the short answer discussion questions, and one long-form essay where students are asked to "fill in" part of the story with their own.
