


A Lesson on Mama's Happy Christmas by Natalie Lebron

Grade Level: Grade 4

Subject Area: English Language Arts **Lesson Length**: 1 hour 30 minutes

Lesson Keywords: Reading, writing, Mama's Happy Christmas

Lesson Description: The goal of this lesson is to give students the opportunity to use reading and writing habits they've been practicing on a regular basis to understand and summarize the main ideas of the storyline. By reading and rereading the passage closely, and focusing their reading through a series of questions and discussion about the text, students will define key vocabulary, analyze the order of events, name the the problems and solutions, and lastly identify how and why the Johnson family had a happy Christmas. I will also give them an opportunity to reflect and write freely on their own personal experiences.

Instructions: Please read the following reading passage as many times as needed (aloud and silent) before starting to go through other lesson pages. Understanding the content of this passage is very important since the lesson activities will be all about this content. Feel free to print the passage if needed.
