


A Lesson on The Boy Who Cried Wolf! by Morgan Johnson

Grade Level: Grade 3

Subject Area: English Language Arts **Lesson Length**: 1 hour 30 minutes

Lesson Keywords: Reading, Writing, Vocabulary

Lesson Description: ?The Boy Who Cried Wolf? is the story of a young shepherd. Growing bored with his work, he shouts ?Wolf!? to make the townspeople come running. He laughs at them and at their anger when they find he has tricked them. The objectives of this lesson is Students will discuss honesty and responsibility and Students will make connections with the text. Students are asked to answer vocabulary and text dependent questions, make inferences, and analyze the authors purpose.
