

A Lesson on A Good Student by Patrick Gilhooley

Grade Level: Grade 7 Subject Area: English Language Arts Lesson Length: 2 hours

Lesson Keywords: Reading, reading comprehension, writing, a good student

Lesson Description: The goal of this lesson is to have students implement their reading and writing abilities to learn about an anonymous student?s account of his or her first day experience in high school. By reading and rereading the assigned passage, and furthering their understanding through various questions and discussions coinciding with the passage, the students will learn how a good student thinks and behaves. By combining this text with an assigned writing, students will learn how to elaborate on the information they read.

Task 2: Forum Discussion

Instructions: This discussion forum will have questions for students to respond. Read the posted questions, and respond to each. Students are responsible for posting one initial and and two peer responses for each topic.

2 - How should the author change his or her behavior?

In the reading, the author states that he or she was late for math class and was scolded by the teacher for doing so. Based on what happened beforehand, how might the author change his or her behavior in order to avoid being late again?

3 - How does the author feel about his or her teachers?

Based on the student's recollection of his or her day in school, how does the teacher view her teachers? Is he or she distrustful of them? Does he or she try and fight against them or look up to them? Use?examples?from the passage to support your answer.?

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Task 3: Writing Activity

Instructions: Based on what you learned about the author's schedule, interests, and hobbies, write about what a typical day might look like for him or her?later on in the school year. Write at least 2-3?paragraphs (250 words) and provide examples provided in the text to support your answer.?

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
