


A Lesson on The Boy Who Cried Wolf! by Alexis Billings

Grade Level: Grade 3

Subject Area: English Language Arts

Lesson Length: 2 hours

Lesson Keywords: reading, writing, the boy who cried wolf

Lesson Description: The goal of this lesson is for students to use their reading skills to understand the message behind the story of The Boy Who Cried Wolf. By reading and rereading the passage, the students will need to be able to understand the vocabulary and answer questions about it. The students will also need to answer discussion questions about the text and write a short essay explaining how they can relate to the story.
